Whether you're Catholic, used to be Catholic, or you have Catholic loved ones, we're here for you.

It's OK if your relationship to faith is complicated. It's OK if you're not sure how to feel about abortion. It's OK if the word "abortion" doesn't match your experience. You don't need to name it. You don't need to feel a certain way. You just need to be.

Catholics have abortions.

The stigma around abortion can make it hard for Catholics to talk about. But abortion is incredibly common, and everyone knows Catholics who've had abortions.

In the U.S., 1 in 4 abortion patients is Catholic (Guttmacher Institute 2016).

People of faith have abortions all the time — in fact, most people who have abortions are religious. Anyone who goes to Mass is surrounded by Catholics who've had abortions.

Most Catholics support reproductive rights.

From the time Mary said "yes" when asked if she would bear the son of God, our faith tradition has affirmed the right to choose whether to become pregnant. As Catholics, we are called to honor human dignity, and that means supporting people as they make decisions about their lives.

We love the many teachings, writings, and traditions that make up our faith, and we also know that Catholicism is more than what the official doctrine says.

The church is the body of Christ. Time and time again, polls show that our church supports people who choose abortion.

For most of church history, abortion was not severely condemned.

Until recently, Catholic leaders taught that the morality of abortion depended on the stage of pregnancy. Both St. Augustine and St. Aquinas, two of the most honored theologians of all time, taught that the fetus did not have a soul until later in pregnancy, so abortion early in pregnancy was not considered ending a life as Catholic leaders say today.

This was the most common belief among church leaders until 1869, when Pope Pius IX announced a ban on abortion. That ban wasn't added to church law until 1917, barely over a century ago.







The church has never formally excommunicated someone for having an abortion.

You may have heard that having an abortion will get you excommunicated. The Catechism of the Catholic Church says that the type of excommunication that an abortion can cause is "latae sententiae," literally meaning "a sentence already carried out," which means that no human person officially excommunicates you.

In 2016, Pope Francis made a permanent rule that any priest could forgive those who have had abortions and welcome them into the church.

Even with that change, however, it is important to remember that the decision to have an abortion is between you and God, and that **God will still love you and accept you** whether or not you ever speak to a priest.

Catholicism is based on a **deep respect for conscience**, which the catechism says must be the final judge in any decision we make.

Anyone who follows their conscience to have an abortion hasn't sinned.

At the end of the day, **you belong to this church. Your baptism cannot be undone.** God understands your situation better than anyone, and no one can separate you from God's love (Romans 8:38-39).

Abortion is a moral choice. God loves people who have abortions.

KATE'S STORY

It's normal to pray during an abortion.

"I'm an abortion doula, which means that I go into abortion clinics and support people during the procedure.

I also help people find abortion medication since reproductive healthcare has become so hard to access.

Every clinic shift, I serve someone who thinks that they're the only person from their parish who would choose to have an abortion. Let me tell you this: Abortion clinics across the country are filled with Catholics just like you.

I've held the hands of so many Catholics during their abortions. I've stood in the clinic and prayed with people who knew that they'd made the right decision for themselves and their loved ones.

I am called to do this work because I know that abortion is healthcare. To me, there is no act more loving than to give your unconditional, wholehearted support to people at every stage of their reproductive journeys.

GABRIELLE'S STORY

It's normal to struggle with the decision.

Sadly, it's not typical to have a priest as accepting as this storyteller's, but you might be surprised by how supportive your community can be.

"In my early 20s I was employed in a low-wage job with no health benefits.

Throughout this time, I relied on Planned Parenthood as the only healthcare provider I could afford for any kind of care.

I found myself in an abusive relationship and an unstable living situation. As I worked toward finding the courage to leave, I discovered I was pregnant. I wasn't ready to be a parent. I could hardly take care of myself.

I also knew a child would be a way to trap me, keeping me poor and dependent. **And I knew that it was no kind of life for a child.** I turned to my local Planned Parenthood office, where I found kindness, support, and a necessary abortion.

While I have ultimately kept this decision to myself, when I think about what might have been,

I never regret the choice I made.

Even so, it was with trepidation that, 17 years after my abortion, I entered a confessional. The welcome that I received from my parish priest was unwavering — and surprising.

When we talked about why it had been so long since my last confession, I did not feel the anger or judgment I feared from him. I felt only the grace and compassion that my faith taught me.

My Catholic faith is an integral part of who I am, but it is not without an internal struggle. The church I was raised in judged women harshly, and current church hierarchy still does.

However, a few years ago at Mass, flanked by my children, I wept silently as my parish priest acknowledged how much pressure and poor treatment the church has put on women over the centuries.

Even as I see lawmakers in my state and federal government use the church hierarchy to push pro-birth agendas, I still believe there is hope for us to **move forward with grace and compassion.**

And I know for certain that I never want my own daughter to carry doubt or shame about doing what she knows to be right — so we will have uncomfortable conversations and open discussions when the church gets it wrong."

DR. JEN'S STORY

It's normal to change your mind about abortion.

"I am an OB-GYN and complex family planner, which means that I provide birth control, give pap smears, do cancer screenings, deliver babies, and I also provide abortion care. I was raised Catholic, and Catholicism is a huge part of what formed my identity. It's one of the main reasons that I do this work.

I didn't always support abortion access.

As a first generation Cuban American, I grew up in a conservative household and was once an anti-abortion activist. When I was 19, my fiancé and I were planning on abstaining from sex until marriage because of the teachings of the church. But after a lot of thought, we decided that we wanted to have sex. I actually asked my dad for permission first. But unfortunately, after the first time, I needed the morningafter pill. I went to a family planning clinic that also provided abortions. I had to walk through protesters screaming horrible things at me, and I remembered thinking, 'I'm one of you guys! I'm pro-life too!'

But when I entered the clinic, I realized that nobody could tell the difference between me and the other people in the waiting room. I didn't know who was there for a pap smear, for contraception, or for an abortion. I had judged people for so long. I thought that I had the right idea as a faithful Catholic.

Many years later, when I was becoming a doctor, I cared for a patient who was having an induction abortion — we had to induce labor to end a complicated pregnancy that had no possibility of viability.

The person who was supervising me refused to do the abortion. I was on the night shift, and my supervisor left me by myself, abandoning the patient and abandoning me. It was the first abortion I was participating in.

After the procedure, the woman wanted to hold her baby. The baby was quite anomalous, and I was nervous about what she might think. But I wrapped it up as best as I could and gave it to her. This woman gazed down at her baby and said, 'Look at how beautiful my daughter is.'

And in that moment, I realized that I could never understand **the complexity of reproduction, love, and life** the way that this woman did. She loved her daughter so deeply that she ended the pregnancy.

In that moment, my life changed. I decided to provide abortions because of the Catholic values instilled in me — justice, fairness,

and compassion for my fellow human beings. My time on this earth is better spent receiving people with love rather than pushing them away in judgment.

And even though this story involved a case of fetal anomaly, I realized that any reason to have an abortion is a good reason.

The people who come to me for abortion care know what they need.

When I was a young anti-abortion activist, I believed that I was pro-life, but now I understand that providing reproductive care is the most pro-life thing I possibly can do.

When a patient comes to me, I help them. I don't judge them. They are the experts of their own lives."
